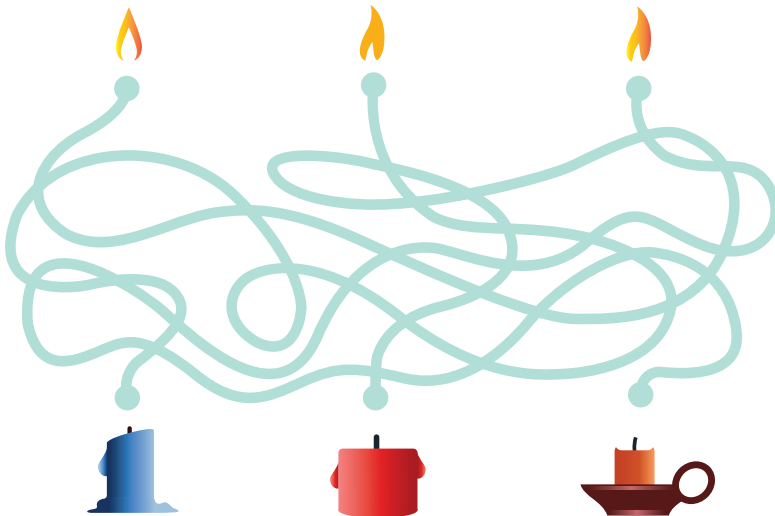

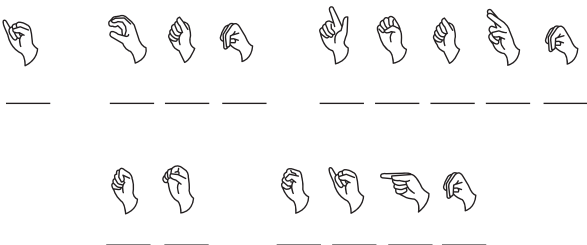
## Tangled lines

Follow the tangle of wicks to match the candles to their flames.



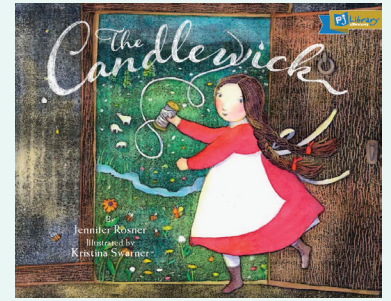
## Secret message
