


A Note from PJ Goes to School

Ruthie and her family are traveling home from selling wool at the market when they meet Bayla and her baby, Aaron. Ruthie's family stops to help. Bayla is deaf and has developed many ways to communicate with others. Inspired by how Bayla maintains a connection with Aaron, even when they're sleeping, Ruthie sees past Bayla's challenges to admire her ingenuity. Ruthie then knits a mother/baby mitten set for Bayla and Aaron, which demonstrates Ruthie's understanding of Bayla's unique needs.

Values
