Hamantaschen are being baked, costumes are being pulled together, and graggers are spinning. It can all mean only one thing: Purim is coming!

JEWISH CONCEPTS

Purim, like many Jewish holidays, is a celebration of the Jewish people's redemption from catastrophe. It's also a noisy, riotous, carnival-like festival, which makes it especially fun for kids! Children and grown-ups alike dress up in costume and get ready to party. The story of Purim – how the Jewish queen of Persia, Esther, saved her people from doom – is told in the Book of Esther (*Megillah* in Hebrew). On Purim, the Megillah is read aloud in synagogues all over the world – and this is one time when no one is discouraged from making noise during the service! In fact, listeners shake their groggers (Yiddish for "noisemakers") every time they hear the name of the villain of the story, Haman. Many communities also stage funny Purim spiels (Yiddish for "plays") to accompany the Megillah reading.

In addition to dressing in costume and listening to the Megillah, many families make *hamantaschen*, filled triangular cookies, and share these and other treats with friends and relatives in Purim baskets (*mishloach manot* in Hebrew).
